Why writing

- Higher education in the U.S. is writing heavy,
- Advanced English speakers in Iraq often speak much better than they write,
- A solid essay can make your application much stronger.



Personal Statement

Mini biography

Answer the question: "Who are you"

Focus = education, work experience, professional/personal development

Content should be focused on your field of study

Highlight experiences that have affected your growth

Things to include: achievements, talents, goals, interests

Things not to include: basic facts about yourself, ie DOB, marital status, religion,

address etc.

Sell yourself. Would you give yourself a Fulbright scholarship after reading your

essay

Format:

Paragraph 1 = personal introduction

Paragraph 2 = relevant skills/experiences/achievements and how you would

benefit the program

Paragraph 3 = why you want the scholarship and how it would help your career

plans

Personal Statement Continued...

This personal statement should be a narrative statement describing how you have achieved your current goals.

- It should include information about your education, practical experience, special interests, and career plans.
- Describe any significant factors that have influenced your educational or professional development.
- Comment on the number of years of practical experience already completed in the field in which academic work will be done in the United States.
- Do not mention specific U. S. universities at which you would like to study.
- It is strongly recommended that you upload in PDF format.





Research Objective

Answer who, what, when, where, why and how of your study plan

What = innovative, research methods, your plan, importance

Why = your goals, your candidacy

How = personal, benefit your country, qualifications

Important: Fulbright's goal of increasing cultural understanding

Format:

Paragraph 1 = what you want to study, your overall goal

Paragraph 2 = the expertise you have to achieve this goal

Paragraph 3 = why you want this opportunity, and why the U.S. (why not Iraq)

Paragraph 4 = how this will help your home country

Research Objective Continued...

Study Plan / Research Objective:

- Write a clear and detailed <u>description of your study/research objectives</u>, and give your <u>reasons for wanting</u> to pursue them.
- Be <u>specific</u> about your major field and your specialized interests within this field.
- Describe the kind of program you expect to undertake, and explain how your <u>study plan fits in with your previous training and your future</u> <u>objectives</u>.

This statement is an essential part of your application and is required. Do <u>not</u> <u>mention specific U.S. universities</u> at which you would like to study. It is strongly recommended that you upload in <u>PDF</u> format.

Writing Tips

PEEL method for paragraph writing

P = point (topic sentence, what is the reason for this paragraph)

E = evidence (how is this point true)

E = explanation (how does the evidence prove your point

L = link (connect the end of the paragraph to the main point of the essay and/or the next paragraph)

Ex: My pursuit of a degree in solar science in the United States will benefit my home country. Iraq is currently experiencing a financial crisis due to the global drop in oil prices. The government budget is dependent on oil sales. Even before the crisis, people complained about a lack of good electricity, and this will increase with the reduced government revenue. Iraq lacks people trained in solar energy, and therefore cannot develop an alternative to oil which is a source of corruption, war and financial difficulty. By studying solar energy in the United States, I will be learning about an important industry that could help my country develop energy independence and thus improve our lives.

Writing Tips Continued...

- Make an argument
- Don't use fluff
 Ex: It can be said that studying in another country can benefit both the host country and foreign student.
- Every sentence needs to have a purpose
- Avoid passive voice
- Use topic sentences
- Have a strong thesis statement in the first paragraph
- Use simple grammar
- 'Good writing is rewriting'
- Proofreading by yourself, others





Plagiarism

- Definition = presenting someone else's work as your own
- Easy to see (we see it a lot)
- Used intentionally or unintentionally
- Unacceptable in US, consequences
- Will end with your application being terminated
- Software, ie Turnitin
- Someone else's work is their intellectual property
- Paraphrasing





Plagiarism Continued...

Ex:

Imagine, for example, that you read the following passage in the course of your research (from Michael Agar's book *Language Shock*):

"Everyone uses the word *language* and everybody these days talks about *culture*...
."Languaculture" is a reminder, I hope, of the *necessary* connection between its two parts..."

If you wrote the following sentence, it would constitute plagiarism: "At the intersection of language and culture lies a concept that we might call 'languaculture.'"

This sentence borrows a word from Agar's work without giving credit for it.

Placing the term in quotation marks is insufficient. If you use the term, you must give credit to its source:

This is OK: "At the intersection of language and culture lies a concept that Michael Agar has called 'languaculture.'" ("Language Shock," Michael Agar).






Plagiarism Continued...
