The Fulbright Junior Faculty Development Programs for Egypt and Jordan and the Fulbright Visiting Scholar Program for Iraq bring junior faculty in various discipline-based cohorts to the United States for intensive 10-week programs for faculty development, mentoring, and cultural exchange activities. The intent of these programs is to equip junior academics with the knowledge and tools needed to build higher education capacity in the grantees' home countries to advance education for future generations and foster long-term collaboration and institutional linkages.

AMIDEAST is <u>seeking interested contacts</u> from institutions wishing to host a cohort of six to eight junior faculty during the summer of 2020. Institutions may apply to host a <u>specific discipline</u> of junior faculty from the table below.

Program Objectives:

- * Build higher education capacity in the home country of junior faculty through faculty development and mentoring.
- Foster long-term collaboration and institutional linkages between junior faculty and U.S. academics.
- * Promote mutual understanding between the home country of the junior faculty and Americans by facilitating engagement with the broader host campus community.

Program Components:

- * Orientation session for arriving junior faculty.
- * On-campus academic program designed to advance understanding of new teaching and research techniques and U.S. higher education.
- * Mentorship by U.S. host institution faculty.
- * Cultural and community engagement activities.

Funding:

Host Institutions will receive a maximum amount of up to \$15,600 per junior faculty participant, inclusive of administrative costs, participant support costs, and housing costs.

The Junior Faculty:

Participating junior faculty will be nominated though an open, merit-based competition with final selections made in February 2020. Junior faculty will be highly motivated to engage with colleagues and others within their host campuses and communities in the United States, and every effort will be made to select candidates representing a broad range of universities and regions within the three countries.

Selected junior faculty must meet the following criteria:

- * Current full-time university faculty member.
- * Possess, at a minimum, a master's degree and at least three years of university-level teaching experience or a PhD and no more than eight years of teaching experience.
- Demonstrated commitment to classroom teaching and a desire to strengthen their teaching and academic leadership skills.
- Fluent spoken and written English.
- Academic focus in one of the programs' offered academic discipline cohorts.
- Available to travel to the United States and participate for the duration of the program.
